Reconsidering European Contributions to Global Justice

Since its inception the European Union (EU) has proclaimed an ambition to promote justice at the global level. But what precisely is the EU's contribution? And what would a *just* foreign policy look like?

The GLOBUS project studies the contents and conduct of the EU's external policies with a particular focus on climate justice, migration, trade and development regimes, peace and conflict resolution, gender and human rights.

Justice as a contested concept

What is considered a legitimate claim of justice in the eyes of Europe may conflict with perspectives elsewhere in the world. Research in GLOBUS takes into account the experience and perspectives of state and non-state actors outside of Europe, with a particular focus on Brazil, China, India, and South Africa.

A new research agenda

GLOBUS sets out a new research agenda for the study of the EU's international role. It engages with theoretical debates on how we should think about justice beyond states' borders. With a conceptual scheme that suggests different understandings of global justice, GLOBUS directs attention to the underlying political and structural challenges to justice.

GLOBUS combines normative and empirical research to critically analyse the EU's contribution to ensure justice at the global level.

GLOBUS brings together a multidisciplinary and cross-cultural team of scholars from politics, international relations, philosophy, economy, law and sociology.
